Time for New Beginnings

The 'Weather' is always a great conversation starter. And now the topic of climate change tends to raise the bar several notches. While other areas of the world are already in the grip of big changes in weather patterns we are still waiting to see what will happen in our little corner of the globe. In warmer regions drinking water is becoming a scarce resource, and deserts are creeping into once cultivated land. We know all this, but perhaps this Advent might be an appropriate moment to reflect, for a change, on what kind of world we are welcoming the Christ Child into? Many of the Advent readings have an ecological 'slant' reminding us that Jesus came, not just for me, not just for us but to inaugurate the reign of God, to reveal the beginning of a new creation. At the very start of Advent Isaiah shouts his excitement "Let the wilderness and the dry lands exult, let the wastelands rejoice and bloom; let it bring forth flowers like the jonquil, let it rejoice and sing for joy"



Because:
"God is coming to save you"
And the sign of this coming will be, not only that the sick will be healed, but also, incredibly, creation itself "for water gushes in the desert, streams in the wastelands, the scorched earth becomes a lake... There is a very close connection between the state of humankind and the state of creation in the Bible. From the very beginning God made it so. The first humans were entrusted with the garden that was earth to till and care for it. After they sinned, earth also began to get disorderly and out of control. The author in Genesis says that God "Cursed" the earth because of human sinfulness: "Accursed be the soil because of you! By the sweat of your brow will you earn your food"

Sin is like a contagious disease. It destroys relationships, not only between God and humans, or between humans themselves, but also between humans and the world around us. Advent, the beginning of a new Liturgical year, is a time of new beginnings. A season of active waiting and expectancy. It is a time to "prepare the way of the Lord" How? By taking the time to reflect more deeply on the ecological aspects of Incarnation. Of Jesus taking human flesh and becoming human. One consequence of this great mystery is that all of the natural and human world is sacramental; each created thing reveals some aspect of God's life. But is it beyond the bounds of possibility to envisage, sometime in the future, in some place, that there is no water to baptise an infant, because all the fresh water has dried up?. Or that the grain has become so contaminated that bread is poisonous? Experts have pointed out more than once that a polluted earth cannot truly reveal or convey the love, life, and holiness of the Divine. It is still not too late to take the collective steps needed, although the need to do so is of absolute urgency.

The mystery of Incarnation allows us a glimpse of the indwelling presents of the Divine in all things, throughout all human history and within our daily, yearly lives. Jesus came not just to be born, but to remain with us. With this faith our eyes open to see God's presence, not only in certain people, certain experience, but all around us. Everything is infused with the sacred. Reverence is an attitude to pray for; awareness and mindfulness too. Can you see the presence of God in the world around you, in creation, in the life of the people? What contribution can you make to caring for the earth?
