## Change in Confession Times

You will notice signs outside three of the Confession Boxes in the Church telling you that in future the Sacrament will be held from 10.30 to 11.30 on Saturday morning in either of the Confession Boxes near the Sacristy door, depending on which box is showing the green pilot light. The reason for the shorter hours is that this year we will have less priests available to hear confessions, especially when we have funerals. There is no change to Saturday evening arrangements when Confessions begin at 6.45pm

## World Migrant and Refugee Sunday

Pope Benedict XVI in his message for the World Day for Migrants and Refugees, on Jan 16, 2011, has chosen the theme 'one family of brothers and sisters in societies that are becoming even more multiethnic and intercultural, where also people of various religions are urged to take part in dialogue, so that a serene and fruitful coexistence with respect for legitimate differences may be found'. "The World Day of Migrants and Refugees offers the whole Church an opportunity to reflect on a theme linked to the growing phenomenon of migration, to pray that hearts may open to Christian welcome and to the effort to increase in the world justice and charity, pillars on which to build an authentic and lasting peace," wrote the Pontiff. "All" he continued, "belong to one family, migrants and the local populations that welcome them, and all have the same right to enjoy the goods of the earth whose destination is universal, as the social doctrine of the Church teaches. It is here that solidarity and sharing are founded."
