Thought for the Week

"Laudate omnes gentes, Laudate Dominum" Taize Chant (Praise all nations, Praise the Lord)

EASTER 2023

Holy Week began with Jesus entering into Jerusalem with palm branches being waved at him. The journey continued to Holy Thursday when we recalled the Last Supper where Jesus instituted the Eucharist and the Priesthood; a moment too when Jesus called all of us to SERVICE of one another demonstrated by the washing of feet. We entered then into Good Friday when we commemorated the Solemn Passion of Jesus Christ. We've been taking part in a great drama, recalling very unique moments in the life of Jesus and in the history of humanity's relationship with God. Today we have arrived at a crescendo moment. The Exsultet, sung at our Easter Vigil says, "This is the night when, with a pillar of fire, you banished the darkness of sin. This night, even now, sets Christians apart from worldly vices and from the gloom of sin, leading them to grace and joining them to the holy ones. The night, when Christ broke the prison-bars of death and rose victorious from the underworld." Easter proclaims the triumph of light over darkness, hope over despair, life over death. To paraphrase the poet Gerald Manly Hopkins, ALL IS SACRED and CHARGED WITH THE GRANDEUR OF GOD. Even surveying nature all around us, everything is changed with grandeur, opening our hearts and minds to a sacred awe and wonder.

The Resurrection invites us to trust that the God who raised Jesus from the darkness of the cross will extend that same graciousness – and grandeur – to us in our death. For Jesus, as for us, death will not be the last word about our lives. Resurrection tells us that God is all loving, all powerful and life-giving. We will not be left to the dust of history but will be gathered into new life in his presence, as Jesus was. Frederick Buechner said, "Resurrection means that the worst things are never the last things." Crucifixion and death were horrible realities but not the last words about Jesus. God's love prevailed.

The great gift of Easter is hope, renewal and new life. The great spiritual writer, Joyce Rupp, Benedictine Sister, says. "Easter is about "tomb watches". It is about a love that keeps vigil and waits and believes in life, no matter how dark, empty, fearful and cold the inner space feels. Easter is about hope that is willing to sit in the tomb and trust in transformation. Easter is about faithful companions who keep watch with us and cheer us on as we await for our inner resurrection because of what Jesus has done."

Where "resurrection" now? When we move out of dark and difficult moments; when we receive encouragement; when we are moved by a sunrise or a sunset; when the beauty of nature urges us to a deep wonder; when we overcome adversity; when we are forgiven and set free; when we are accompanied on our journey by caring, loving and kind people; when we find some quiet and peace and see more clearly; when we overcome family strife; when we find acceptance and comfort in the face of death, loss and grief; when we celebrate Eucharist; when we are touched by an awareness of God-with-us. Ultimately, resurrection in its fullness comes to us when, in death, God will gather us into his presence and life, as he did with Jesus. The words of Jesus are our eternal hope: "I AM THE RESURERECTION AND THE LIFE, ALL WHO BELIEVE IN ME WILL NEVER DIE. May the blessings of peace, healing and hope which the Risen Christ brings find a dwelling place in all your hearts this Eastertime.

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Sunday Liturgy of the Word

FIRST READING Acts 10:34.37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles. Peter addressed them: You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the country -side of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself; and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness; that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name." The Word of the Lord.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb" she said "and we don't know where they have put him." So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in, he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.
