THE SEASON OF LENT 2024

LENT is a time when Christians prepare for the great feast of Easter. It is a scared time within the Church's liturgical year. It's a time of fasting, prayer and almsgiving. The season lasts for 40 days reminding us of the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert preparing for his mission, a time when he fasted and prayed. Lent comes from a word "lente" which means springtime. What can we do individually, as a family and as a Parish community to bring about a "springtime" of new spiritual life and growth in God's ways?

THREE THINGS TO DO FOR LENT

FASTING AND ABSTINENCE: We try to keep our meals simple and small during lent. The thinking behind fasting is that we strengthen our inner resolve to live more **IN CHRIST** and in **GOD'S WAYS.** Fasting and abstinence make us more appreciative of our daily blessings and remind us that many people in our world are starving and have little of life's blessings.

ALMSGIVING: When we fast and abstain from certain things, we can put some of the money saved towards a charity who work with the poor, the hungry, the homeless and all who are often forgotten about in our world, all who come to our country for refuge and support. Usually, we take a **TROCAIRE BOX** for this purpose but also out of our **POOR BOX** donations, we reach out to Br. Kevin's Day Care Centre, Alice Leahy TRUST, ALONE and ARC (a local organisation) and TALLAGHT OUTREACH to the HOMELESS: all these have received donations from the Poor Box donations.


PRAYER: St. Padre Pio said: "Prayer is the key which opens the door to God's heart." Our lives can be so hectic that we find little room for peace, stillness or prayer. Yet, prayer is essential in deepening our relationship with Jesus.
