Thought for the Week

We are born to love, we live to love, and we will die to love still more.

St Joseph

REFLECTION – 28th FEBRUARY, 2021

In today's gospel Jesus becomes radiant and aglow as he is recognised as **"my son, the beloved, the chosen one"**. This mountain top experience is hugely significant for Jesus. He is called **"in love"**. He is now deeply aware of who he truly is. His identity is affirmed. The deepest part of Jesus is called forth. This mountain top is a sanctuary for Jesus, a moment to get away from his busy life, a time to pray to his Father and to be with his disciples. Such is the beauty of this moment for the disciples that they express the desire to dwell with this experience; **"let's build three tents..."**. It was indeed a special moment for Jesus and his disciples.

Albert Einstein said, **"Look deep into nature and then you will understand everything better"**. And the South African poet, Gift Gugu Mona, said, **"Be thankful for every mountain because it is the mountaintop that will give you the best view of the world"**.

Somehow I imagine Jesus had a great respect for nature. Many of his parables were inspired by nature. I believe too that this mountaintop moment for Jesus enabled him to see things differently, to keep going in his mission. In the affirmation that he is the chosen one, Jesus knows he is not alone on the journey he must now make towards Jerusalem.

The gift of nature is a wonderful gift. It draws us beyond ourselves. At this time of year isn't it such a blessing to notice the bursting forth of new life and colour. Soon, we will be able to spend time in our gardens. Whenever I'm close to mountains, walking by a river or the sea, or walking in a forest or simply admiring the tall, elegant willow tree in my back garden, my heart is raised heavenward. The delights of nature can **"transfigure"** our ordinary moments into moments of grace and blessing. Often, just by being in silence before the grandeur of nature we sense something greater than ourselves. For me, I sense the presence of God. I am moved, like the psalmist to pray: **"Come ring out our joy to the Lord. Let us come before him, giving thanks. With songs, we praise the Lord. The heights of the mountains are his, to him belongs the sea and the dry lands, shaped by his hands"**. I can imagine Jesus offering this prayer of gratitude on this mountain top moment.

This transfiguring moment was not the only one for Jesus. Similar moments took place frequently in the mission of Jesus. Jesus transfigured the lives of many people - the lame, the crippled, the sick, the broken, the unloved, the outcast - all were touched and changed by the presence of Jesus' love. Jesus called to the deepest part of people, enabling them to see their inner beauty, dignity and preciousness in the eyes of God. As Jesus was called in love as **"the beloved"** by his Father, so too Jesus calls us **"the beloved of God"**. This truth should give us healing and peace within as we face our own hurdles and challenges in life. We don't have to go to the mountaintop to have this awareness of God's love for us. We can have this moment in quiet prayer, in the silence (if possible), visiting our Church to light a candle and pray, admiring nature, doing a good deed for another. **"Sometimes when we just stand still, the grace finds us"**. (Mary Davis). May we be **"transfigured"** by this grace of God this coming week. **Fr. Tony**

Lent is an extremely important time of year for Trócaire. The organisation relies heavily on the income that comes in during Lent through the generosity of schools and parishes. The ongoing lockdown presents different challenges especially in relation to the distribution of Lenten Boxes. This year's Lenten Campaign focuses on Awut and Ajak, two women brought together by the horror of war. Their solidarity is an example of what Pope Francis tells us in his recent encyclical, Fratelli. At a time of great uncertainty and fear, it reminds us to always work together to protect the most vulnerable.

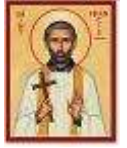

All you need do is go to St. Agnes Parish, Crumlin and press the **"Watch Live"** wording: under **RECORDINGS** the mass for the day will appear and play for you. If you use this facility at any time, please use a lighted candle and choose a quiet time to join prayerfully and spiritually with the Recorded Mass. If you have any difficulty, call the Parish Office.

NOVENA OF GRACE



Because of the pandemic, we cannot have the normal Novena of Grace in our Church. However, we will be dedicating the **9.00am mass each morning from 4th – 12th March as a Novena of Grace Mass**. We will recite the Novena Prayer each morning. The statue of St. Francis Xavier will be placed at foot of the sanctuary. We will also have a special box into which you can place your personal prayers and intentions which will be remembered at all masses for the duration of the Novena Masses.

The 9.00am mass is now recorded so that you can watch it at any time during the day for your own personal time of prayer and reflection. Go Crumlin Parish Website and under Watch Live, you'll find "recordings": just press on the date of recorded masses and it should play for you.

First and second mass collections

Due to the COVID restrictions since March 2020 with churches not being open for public masses the 1st and 2nd mass collections have suffered greatly. These mass collections go directly to Archdiocese of Dublin with the first collection being allocated to pay all the priests of the Diocese including sick and retired priests. The second collection goes towards poorer parishes and pastoral training and pastoral programmes along with Diocesan administration. Going forward, in order to get a steady income up and running again the Archdiocese of Dublin is asking parishioners to sign up to a standing order for these collections, if they are in a position to do so. The forms for this are available from our parish office. Alternatively first and second collections offerings can be donated directly to Archbishop's House through the donate facility on St Agnes parish website. The Diocese wish to thank all parishioners for their support over the years.

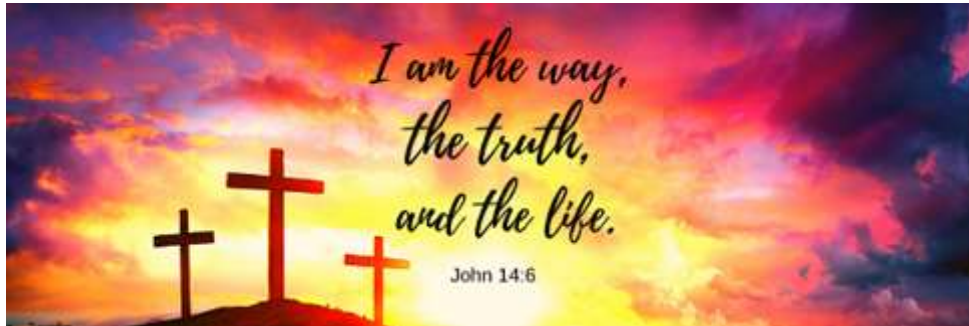

New Pilgrim Path Website of the Week.



New Pilgrim Path's featured website for the week beginning Sunday next, the 2nd Sunday in Lent, is 'Forty Days', a visual meditation based on 40 great works of art.

Forty is a significant number in the Bible. Rain fell for 40 days during the Flood. The Israelites wandered for 40 years. Moses was on Mount Sinai for 40 days. Jonah preached in Nineveh for 40 days. Christ fasted 40 days in the desert. The Ascension took place 40 days after Easter Sunday.

It seems a cruel coincidence that this Lent coincides with at least 40 more days of lockdown (or quarantine - another 40!) in many countries. Yet, this video reminds us that at the end of every significant 40 days in the Bible, significant transformation occurred. Moses received the 10 Commandments. The Israelites found the Promised Land. Jonah converted Nineveh. Christ began his great redemptive mission. May this Lent transform us, too. Access this – and many other excellent Lent resources, at: www.newpilgrimpath.ie
